TRUSTEE'S REPORT

The Trustees present their report and the unaudited financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2014.

Structure, Governance and Management

Organisation

The Trust Deed provides for the appointment of Trustees in accordance with the relevant statutory provisions.

The Trustees are responsible for the overall management of the Charity. The day to day operations of the Charity are carried out by the Director and other staff.

The Trustees are appointed and elected by Directors, Chair & other Trustees.

Public benefit

The Trustees have complied with their duty under Section 17 of the Charities Act 2011 to have due regard to public benefit guidance published by the Charity Commission.

Objectives and activities

Objects of the Charity

The principle objects of the Charity are the advancement of education and the provision of facilities for recreation and the leisure-time occupation for the children resident in Glastonbury in the County of Somerset and elsewhere in the South of England, being facilities of which such children have need by reason of the youth or social and economic circumstances, physical, mental and spiritual well-being.

In furtherance of these objects, the Trustees may also attend and organise special events for the benefit of children with special needs outside the South West of England.

Review of activities

The Trustees are pleased to report a successful year in meeting our objectives in working with children of all abilities, in schools and other settings. Children's World has again provided well received educational and entertainment opportunities, which children would not otherwise have had access to. Also, working alongside children and educators to further their understanding and positive attitudes and behaviour in response to a variety of issues, including bullying and disability.

April:

Puppetry & Integration Workshop Week 1 - Baytree and Herons' Moor Schools:

Forty students of all abilities from two school's in Weston-super-Mare worked together on a project that promotes inclusion and teamwork. Through the five workshop days the students were challenged to create, produce, and perform a large scale puppet show to an invited audience. Alongside the creation of props, the students contributed to stories, learnt and recorded songs and played large scale inclusive games. Because the group focus is on the one goal, integration takes place unconsciously as everybody works together to the best of their ability.

St Dunstan's School - After School Video Workshops:

Children's World worked with ten teenagers over four weeks improvising and filming a spoof of Harry Potter and the Philosopher's Stone, which was edited and put on DVD for each participant.

Mav:

Ashton Gate out of School Club:

'The Mystery of the Caretaker's Chest' was filmed with a group of twenty primary school students in Bristol over two sessions.

Greenbank Pool Taster Day:

Children's World provided a day of fun and games supporting Greenbank Pool's open day to raise awareness of the lido in Street.

Puppetry & Integration Workshop Week 2 - Baytree and Herons' Moor Schools

(see above notes on Puppetry & Integration Workshop Week in April)

June:

Elmwood School - Video Workshops:

This set of workshops was delivered to Moderate Learning Difficulties (M.L.D.) students aged 9 - 16 over a series of 5 x 90 minute sessions, during which the students created three different films.

Film 1: The students discuss behaviour within school that could cause upset to others. This covers bullying, exclusion, isolation, and peer pressure. The students then film examples of this behaviour. The resulting film is put to suitably atmospheric music and finished with a subtitled set of questions for further discussion of the themes raised in the film.

Film 2: This film is taken from the results of a workshop with the students involving the use of

masks. Each mask depicts a very simple facial expression. One student is asked to wear a mask while the rest of the group suggest as many words as they can to describe the expression and suggest how the character might be feeling. They also suggest ideas on how the mask wearer should move, and direct the action. The final film is edited and put to music.

Film 3: This film is a comedy that is improvised and filmed immediately with the students. This is done purely for fun as a reward for the students efforts in the other films. Once the tour is completed each school receives a DVD with the final edit of all films produced. This DVD provides a useful alternative resource for P.S.H.E. work throughout the school.

Puppetry & Integration Workshop Week - Redbridge School, Liverpool:

(see above notes on Puppetry & Integration Workshop Week in April)

Pop Tarts at Pilton Working Men's Club:

Devised by the Co-Director's of Children's World, this fundraising show consisted of a tongue-in-cheek Pop Quiz followed by music from a local band.

Glastonbury Festival:

Glastonbury Festival provides the charity with its main source of funds four out of five years, via a donation from its associated trading company. The whole team is involved in making the Festival areas run by Children's World Enterprises a success.

Appointment of New Administrator:

Kristen Lindop was taken on in the role of Administrator and Book-keeper for the charity, replacing Alison Hall.

July:

St Dunstan's School, Glastonbury - Drama Workshop:

This workshop used drama to look anti-social behaviour issues with year seven pupils.

Torquay Festival:

Children's World provided craft workshops, games and performances at Torquay Town Hall as part of their festival.

August:

Video Workshop - Sherborne Youth Club:

A fun video day, Children's World worked with 16 children from Sherborne Youth Club to create a music video for the song 'Amarillo'. Feedback showed the children felt more confident, happier and interested in arts events post session.

Pilton Working Men's Club Anniversary:

Our team provided a children's gameshow and parachute games.

September:

Transition & Induction Day - Swanmead Middle School:

Delivered to the new year five intake, this workshop is designed as a supplement to the regular induction work done by schools. The material is aimed particularly at dissipating concerns the children may have, and helping them see how they can look after themselves

and their fellow students, and be successful and confident in a new environment.

Glastonbury Abbey Evening:

We provided a children's gameshow and parachute games.

'Del's Deliveries' Tour for S.L.D. & P.M.L.D Students:

This Tour was delivered in three special schools via five sessions each throughout October - Baytree, Weston-super-Mare; Selworthy, Taunton and New Fosseway, Bristol.

Del's Deliveries is a series of 90 minute workshops aimed at key stage 2 Severe Learning Difficulties (S.L.D) and Profound Multiple Learning Difficulties (P.M.L.D.) students.

Del delivers parcels for a living, and in each session he takes the students with him to deliver a parcel to a customer. Each customer has different games and exercises that are associated with their profession as well as being educational and entertaining. They also have a simple song that describes their job and is easy to join in. The journeys to and back from each character are realised via video projection of a road journey. The film gives opportunities to learn left and right, traffic light sequences, and road signs. The return journey also includes a memory game. Using this format, we are able to work on many different curricular activities including number and letter recognition, and sorting skills (by colour, by shape, by size, by weight, by texture, etc.).

November:

National Anti-Bullying Week:

Three anti-bullying workshops were delivered in two local schools, Brookside in Street and West Pennard School.

Bullying and Anti-Social Behaviour are issues that regularly need to be addressed in schools, and it can be difficult to think of new ways to allow children to engage and express themselves within this topic. Children's World uses two types of drama based workshop to provide an interesting and fun way to cover this subject.

Anti-bullying 1 - performance & debate: Run by a 2 person team this whole day workshop caters for up to 30 students in the morning and can include many more for the afternoon session. The morning session discusses and defines bullying with the students before rehearsing a performance piece that portrays stylised examples of the issues discussed. This piece is easy and fun to learn, and requires no speech. This performance, set to original music, is then presented to an audience in the afternoon session as a starting point to a discussion around the theme of bullying. The afternoon audience can be as large as the school hall can allow and provides a unique way to ensure everyone is aware of the schools policy towards bullying, and the possibility of updating or improving strategies.

Anti-bullying 2 - Film-making: Our workshop uses film making as the main medium for the students to work with each other and look at these potentially sensitive issues. Alongside the film making, we encourage talk about ways of dealing with difficult situations and opportunities to think about how to behave towards others. The film footage is edited and returned to the school as a DVD. Run by a 2 person team this whole day workshop caters for up to 30 students. After initial discussions to define bullying and anti-social behaviour, the students are encouraged to give different examples and explain how they might occur. These examples are role-played and used to create a short film. The children are encouraged to improvise and act out the examples and film them around the school. The day finishes with a

discussion on any issues raised followed by recapping the schools rules in dealing with these types of problems. After the workshop day, the film footage is taken away, edited and put to music. The final film is usually about 7 minutes in duration.

Children's World received excellent feedback from both teachers and students following the workshops, including:

"It helped us to send out a good message about what to do when you are being bullied." Year 6 student, West Pennard School

"A fantastic couple of learning days." Teacher, Brookside School, Street

December:

Baytree School Xmas Party:

Children's World worked with staff at Baytree School, Weston-super-Mare over two days to put together a comedy video film shown to the students at their Christmas party. The team also provided sensory activities and Christmas themed games.

Pop Tarts Christmas Special:

A Children's World fundraising evening, with our comedy music guiz show and live music.

January 2014:

M.L.D. & E.B.D. Video Workshops Tour

The P.S.H.E. Video Workshops Tour is devised for Moderate Learning Difficulties (M.L.D.) and Emotional and Behaviour Difficulties (E.B.D.) This Tour was delivered in two special schools via five sessions each throughout February - Fairmead, Yeovil and Culverhill, Bristol.

Using film-making as a tool for talking about relationships, behaviour and emotions, the students created three films that were edited producing a DVD for the school to use as a resource (see above notes on Elmwood School Video Workshops in June).

March:

Anti-bullying workshops - St Benedict's School:

Two anti-bullying workshops were given for students at St Benedict's School, Glastonbury - performance & debate and film-making (see above notes on Anti-Bullying Week in November).

Students said:

"It made me think about how other people would feel."

"Filming was fun."

"The film showed that even if you're being bullied you can still have a friend."

"I used to bully people, but this made me stop."

Transition Workshops with Street & Glastonbury Community Learning Partnership:

Children's World provided three workshops for children with potential difficulties transitioning from Primary to Secondary School at St Dunstan's, Glastonbury and Crispin School in Street.

Deb Loveridge, teacher at St Dunstan's School, rated the workshops 'excellent' and 'just right', telling us, "A fabulous day as always, well delivered by Paddy and Charlie. The

children really enjoyed the day and the opportunity to meet potential buddies. Some feel more at ease about the transition post-workshop, some will come for further additional visits. Parents also said they were really pleased with the event and enjoyed discussing it at the dinner table with their children."

Future plans:

Children's World's workshops are consistently well received and feedback remains very positive and enthusiastic. However, we would like to reach more schools and are therefore looking into potential funding sources in order to reduce the cost to schools, while also reviewing, developing and extending the range of workshops offered to both mainstream and special schools. For example, offering a greater range of one-day and half-day workshops could improve the accessibility and affordability of some workshops.

In addition, we plan to improve the marketing of our workshops, entertainment and other activities through better use of social media, re-development of the Children's World website and reviewing and refreshing of printed materials.

The Children's Festival, run in previous years by our charity, has not taken place over the last two years due to funding and weather issues. For 2014, the Trustees have given the go ahead for the Children's World Co-Directors and team develop and deliver a new format of workshops and entertainment for children in Glastonbury and surrounding areas. The new event will be called Off the Streets - a Celebration of Children and Youth. While not designed to be a Children's Festival replacement the Festival will not take place again in 2014.

The Children's World Co-Directors are also in talks with Born Hectic Events to discuss the possibility of staging a three-day Children's Festival with camping. This project is in the earliest stages of development and no specific dates are as yet under discussion.

As a further extension of our work, the Trustees and team are looking into the feasibility of organising a Puppetry & integration Week in Rwanda in early 2015. This potential tour would come under the umbrella of our associated charity, Children's World International.

Overall, the Trustees are pleased that Children's World has successfully maintained it's high standard of operations over the past year and look forward to building on this secure base, carefully extending and expanding our range of activities into financial year 2014/15.

Reserves policy

The Trustees aim to have consistent financial reserves of a minimum of £20,000, but also to build up a fund of an additional £35,000 during Glastonbury Festival years in order to mitigate lack of income from Children's World Enterprises during the Festival's year off.

Trustees' responsibilities in relation to the financial statements

Law applicable to charities in England and Wales requires the trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the charity's financial activities during the year and of its financial position at the end of the year. In preparing those financial statements, the trustees are required to:

- * Select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- * make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;

The trustees are responsible for keeping accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Charities Act 2011. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

NOTES TO THE CONSOLIDATED FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

1 Accounting policies

- a) The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Accounting Practice: Accounting and Reporting by Charities (SORP 2005), issued in March 2005 (Second Edition), UK Accounting Standards and the Charities Act 2011.
- b) These financial statements consolidate the results of the Charity and its wholly owned subsidairy, Children's World Enterprises Limited, on a line by line basis. A separate statement of financial activities for the Charity itself is not presented because the Charity has taken advantage of the exemptions afforded by paragraph 397 of SORP 2005.

The payment under Gift Aid by the subsidiary to the Charity and balances between the two entities have been eliminated on consolidation.

- c) Income from donations is included incoming resources when these are receivable, except as follows:
 - i) When donors specify that donations given to the charity must be used in future accounting periods, the income is deferred until those periods.
 - ii) When donors impose conditions which have to be fulfilled before the charity becomes entitled to use such income, the income is deferred until the pre-condition have been met.
- d) Resources expended are recognised in the period in which they are incurred. Resources expended include attributable VAT which cannot be recovered.
- e) Most expenditure is directly attributable to specific activities, and have been included in those cost categories. Support cost have been allocated 100% towards the charitable activities of the charity.
- f) Depreciation is calculated so as to write off the cost of an asset in equal installments over their estimated useful economic lives as follows:

Motor Vehicle - 25%

Equipment - 20% & 33.3%

- g) Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objects at the discretion of the trustees.
- Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity.
 Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.
